The directors are considering returning the fun tractor pull to the spring weekend. If we did that it would be Friday night. But plans are still in the works. Sunday was the pickup pull, under new management this year. It was necessary to charge non members admission to the pull this year and it was well attended by members and non

members. We thank all those who turned out; the pullers, volunteers, registration & sled personnel and the workers for the refreshment trailer and gate. Thanks to everyone for a successful Spring show.

Tractor Raffle Tickets- As you read this you may or may not be aware that Donnie Livingston, our chief tractor ticket coordinator and seller, has been sidelined with a broken heel since the spring show. The tractor ticket sales have continued without him as best we can, but several shows have been missed due to lack of personnel available. We attended the Manchester MD show, East Waterford and Latimore Valley shows., but have missed others we usually attend. Ticket sales had a strong start but have fallen behind as the year progressed. Fortunately the weather has been good for some of the show weekends, but Latimore Valley was almost completely rained out. Donnie may be released to drive in late July, but will still need help at remaining shows. Our thanks to those who have stepped up to help with ticket sales as much as possible. CURRENT EVENTS-

<u>Public Sales</u> have been good this spring and summer. We provided food service for several sales for Rentzels and have a few scheduled for the fall. We provided food service for the Spring Fling Weekend and the Little Guy's Show. As usual we want to thank all those who turned out to lend a hand at these events. At the current time new sales are scheduled for August 21 and 22 for the last of the Floyd and Helen Miller estates, and on October 24 in Strinestown with Tom Saylor auctioneering. Others are being scheduled.

<u>Work Parties</u> - will be held every Monday evening during the month of September as we prepare the buildings and grounds for the fall show. Most Mondays Paul Fake, Russ Hoffman, Leroy Sterner, Rich Jackson and Rich Sheidy have been working at the showgounds all summer. They have been working on general maintenance, weed control and mowing. The current big project is the replacement of the wall from the wood shop west to the end of the food vendor area. Starting after Labor Day each Monday we will be cleaning out, sweeping up, painting and polishing. September 14 and 21 continue the day at 4:00 thru the evening there will be jobs to be done and anyone can help. If you have any questions, call Sue Knaub at 244-2912, or just show up ready to spend a few hours at work- rain or shine.

<u>Memorial Picnic Tables and Benches</u>- are still available for dedication. As of now, 2 benches and several tables and 2 children's benches are available. After these have all been dedicated, the executive committee will decide if more need to be purchased. Benches, both adult and child sizes are \$50 each, and tables are \$100 each. We have dedicated 25 tables, 51 full size benches and 2 children's benches. The plaque can say anything you want. Any officer or director can accept your dedication and make sure you get a form to fill out for your plaque.

UPCOMING EVENTS-

2015 York Fair- The Society has been invited to return to the York Fair with exhibits for the 2015 season, but there will be some major changes for the 250th anniversary of the fair. We will be exhibiting tractors, gas engines, and equipment as part of an extensive display in Memorial Hall. We will have as much room as before, but everything will be inside, and we will need to know exactly what is coming. There will be 24 hr security so this may interest additional exhibitors. We will be selling raffle tickets for the tractor which will be on display during the week, **WE NEED TRACTORS ETC. FOR THE FAIR DISPLAY.** Please call Donnie Livingston or Sue Knaub if you are willing to bring a tractor, engine or piece of equipment to the fair for the 10 days September 11 to 20. In addition, the fair is looking for a 1950's combine to display next to a brand new combine for comparison through history. If you can help us, please call ASAP to be added to the list When we hear from you we will give details of days and time for delivery to the fairgrounds, which will be similar to

other years, just indoors display. Everything will have to be removed by end of day Monday because there is another show moving in Tuesday AM.

In addition we will be at Penns Cave and Arcadia on the two weekends the fair covers.

The Engine will be on display throughout the 10 days. The York Fair has waived their rules about raffles having to be completed by the end of the fair for our participation. We can help with fuel costs for those hauling items to the fairgrounds and each tractor owner will be given two passes for admission to the fair to use during the 10 days. We also need people to help sell tickets. The fair has promised enough passes to get personnel into the grounds to sell tickets and hand out pamphlets advertising the Steam-O-Rama. Sue will be coordinating both weekends and Donnie will be coordinating sales during the week. We need 3 or 4 people each day. The ticket booth should be manned from noon to about 7PM each day, 10 AM to 8 PM Saturdays and Sundays. Passes will be available for all ticket sellers, and parking is available adjoining the area. Please let us know if you can lend a hand for this important fundraising event.

2015 Steam-O-Rama plans are progressing well but, as usual, much work has yet to be done. We have scheduled a couple of work days in the weeks before the show to take up the slack and create a more leisurely pace during show week. Wednesday September 9, at 9:00 A.M. we will be washing jars for apple butter, cooking the first kettle of apple butter and finishing the last of the bones for Pan Haus and cooking chickens for soup, and some general kitchen cleanup. Lunch will be served and kitchen work will be finished by 1:00. Outside will see work at the cookshack stacking and preparing firewood and cleaning the area, clearing out the rooms under the barn for display space. Wednesday, September 16, we will be making corn soup, vegetable soup and making apple butter. Inside we will be chopping potatoes, cleaning up kitchen areas, preparing bins with flatware, etc. Plenty of sit down jobs are available each workday and lunch is provided. Wednesday September 23 we will be making ham bean soup and making sausage patties. The same schedule as above, we will be making one kettle of apple butter in the cook shack Inside we will be finishing any kitchen cleaning chores. We will be washing jars for the fourth kettle of apple butter to be made Saturday of show week. All kitchen cleanup will be completed. We will be working on outside fence, table and bench cleaning and some placement. We should be finished each day by 1:00 and lunch will be available. We will be putting the stage area in order, cleaning the tray holders and picnic tables, cleaning and arranging the kitchen etc. Again lunch is available for everyone and any *Food Donations* to the meals are always gratefully accepted.. There are always jobs to be done, and doing a couple of half days before show week makes things a lot easier as we get closer to show time. Please consider offering help at any or all of the above days to help make everyone's job a little easier.

Show Week will hopefully see a slower pace with these jobs out of the way. During that last weekend before the show there are also jobs available to be done and if your weekdays are full and you can stop by during Saturday and Sunday September 26 and 27, someone can give you a job. Lunch is available to anyone working on show preparation.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, September 28, 29, and 30 we will be doing much kitchen preparation, and we will be cooking for the show and for workers meals on all three days. These are three days of work preparing the food for the show. Jobs on these days include chopping onions, peppers, eggs, and potatoes; wrapping brownies, cookies and Rice Krispie treats. Work areas are prepared and stocked. We need all the help we can get- <u>Many Hands Make Light Work!!!</u> Outside jobs will be going on at all times. The work day runs from about 8:00 A M to dark with people coming and going as available. Benches and tables need to be placed around the grounds. Mowing and trimming and general cleanup and maintenance will be going on all week. Fencing needs to be placed, signs put in the areas where needed and flea market preparation will be completed. Lunch and Supper are provided throughout the week for all workers and any *food donations* to those meals will be gratefully accepted. If you can't stay all day, an hour or two is welcome and very useful. Steam-O-Rama starts October 1 and the usual plea for help goes out to everyone. With the above schedule, hopefully we won't be exhausted before we even get started. There are jobs for everyone at all times. Sit down, stand up, walk around, stay in one place- anything you can do will be appreciated. As the week goes on we constantly adapt to the weather conditions, the crowd, the events of the time period and the help available. We have the kitchen and cookshack operating constantly during the four days, the trailer operating at the pulling

track when there are activities there, the display areas are open at all times. Registration is open and busy constantly, the train is busy daily, the woodshop is open and working, our food concessionaires are busy throughout the weekend. There is always something going on that needs attention from our working members. Please lend a hand wherever possible to help make this another successful show. If you want to work on a specific job you can check with Sue Knaub to see when that work is scheduled. There is a general schedule at the end of the newsletter. Please hang it up and check the days you can help.

The 58th Annual Steam-O-Rama is featuring tractors, garden tractors, and equipment by Oliver/Hart Paar. The display in the feature building has no volunteer coordinator at the present. Display cases are available in the feature building for small items and literature, and signs and advertising items are always welcome. We will welcome and accommodate entire collections or single items, for one day or the whole weekend. If you plan to bring specific items, please let us know so we can plan for placement and space available. This year's plaque will feature two tractors, an Oliver belonging to Ed Waugh and a Hart Paar belonging to Brian Elligson. Plans are in the works for the pictures. The badge picture is an Oliver 1655 and Oliver Grain Drill belonging to Butch Jackson.

Steam-O-Rama Admission- for 2015 will continue to be \$3.00 per person, and is free to you if you received this newsletter because your membership has been paid up to 2015 show week. You should have a membership card with a large 2014 or 2015 or LIFE stamped on it to present at the gate as you enter. **2014** will get you in and you will n eed to renew your membership for 2015 at registration. A **SINGLE** membership provides free admission for the person listed on the card ONLY. It does not provide free admission for the rest of the occupants of the car. They will be charged admission to the show. It also provides a badge for that named member ONLY. Please don't ask for additional badges, they are also used for admission and only paid members get a badge and free admission.

A Husband and Wife may have paid their two memberships and checked **FAMILY** membership on their form. The new form has an H & W space and the cards should have H & W circled but it is considered 2 single memberships in our records. The reason for this is that when we pay our insurance on our members, we are charged \$1.25 for each single membership and \$3.20 for each family membership. Simple economics is that it is cheaper for us to pay insurance on 2 singles than a family when no children are involved. New forms and membership cards will include an H & W box to check. Those memberships, again, include free admission and badges for the two people involved, not for additional passengers. Grandchildren, while admitted free under 12, are not entitled to badges unless covered under a family membership. A **FAMILY** membership includes free admission and badges for the parents and listed children up to 18 years old. Each parent and children 16 and over will be issued separate membership cards because they could be driving separately. Children listed on family memberships are the only children issued free badges.

We had 1100 badges last year and as far as we know, every member present got a badge. Badges are for members and they are used for admission by gate personnel. If there are any left over at the end of the show, they can be purchased on Sunday for \$1.00 at registration.

Admission for 2016 Steam-O-Rama will be increasing to \$5.00 per person. Our costs keep going up and up and we have put off an admission increase as long as possible. Members, exhibitors, vendors, and children under 12 will continue to be admitted free of charge.

Plaques- are issued to all exhibitors for taking the time and effort to bring tractors, engines, literature, feature items, anything for *exhibit* at Steam-O-Rama. You are not required to be a member to exhibit at the show, but it will be suggested to you at registration. If you take out a membership you are covered by our insurance, you will receive newsletters covering events throughout the year and you will be helping to pay expenses. One plaque will be issued for each registered name, not every item exhibited. You can exhibit under as many names as you wish so long as you fill out the paperwork. 400 plaques have been ordered this year, and they will be distributed as long as they last. If you wait until Sunday to bring an item, there may not be any more plaques left, and that is the chance you will take in waiting. We do not have a minimum exhibit time requirement as some shows do, so you can come for just one day or two and still get your plaque. We hope this is fair to everyone involved.

<u>Golf carts, ATV's Garden Tractors, etc.</u> We'll say it again. The day is coming when you will need to show proof of insurance to operate these items on the grounds of Steam-O-Rama. Our insurers tell us that it is not a

requirement at this time, but **registration** of these items is a requirement at Steam-O-Rama. If you plan to operate a golf cart, ATV, Garden Tractor or other mode of transportation at Steam-O-Rama, it must be registered, you must have your registration card displayed and the driver must be the person who registered the vehicle. This is still free to everyone. Please keep reading for some restrictions on vehicle operation. **NO ONE UNDER 14 YEARS OF AGE** is allowed to operate equipment of any kind without adult supervision. If a parent is not present with a young driver, a responsible adult needs to be prepared to show parental permission for operating that item. The posted SPEED LIMIT is 5 MPH. If an area is congested with pedestrians, or if unsafe conditions are present because of weather or some other reason, these vehicles may be stopped from operating for a period of time or restricted from entering certain areas, especially food areas and parade routes. When you bring the vehicles onto the showgrounds for your use, you agree to operate them under the rules. We really do not want to deny anyone the privilege of operating a small wheeled vehicle during the show, but circumstances can sometimes demand that traffic be stopped. There have been very few problems in the past few years since we have been registering and checking speed, underage drivers and conditions, but one or two people can ruin it for everyone. All driver need to know that the area through the food court is restricted from vehicles and drivers need to park and walk through this area, along with the immediate area near the kitchen and cookshack. These areas will be roped off and signs will direct riders around the area. There are just too many people both big and small to allow motorized vehicles of any kind to enter. This does not include scooters and motorized wheel chairs in use by the handicapped, but does include all golf carts, and tractors of any size. Please try to operate your vehicle as safely and responsibly as possible, or you risk the possibility of being escorted from the showgrounds..

Tractor Safety Course-. Our Safety Officer, Dave Peters has contacted Dr. Sam Steel of Pennsylvania State University to plan a tractor safety course for all operators again this year. Details can be finalized for this year and all operators under 18 years of age will be required to take this course if they haven't in the past. The course has been required every other year, but strongly suggested as a yearly course for younger drivers. All drivers will be given up to date course information when they register the vehicle(s) they plan to operate. This includes tractor pullers, garden tractor pullers, recreational drivers etc. Any other drivers wishing to take the course will be allowed to as time and space is available. Steam-O-Rama has been accident free for many years, but one bad accident can spoil the entire show and cause our liability insurance to skyrocket, or worse, be cancelled. There are sure to be some drivers who see this as unneeded harassment, but the directors and officers see it as absolutely necessary to continue operation. Most parents should see this as an opportunity to teach tractor safety and responsible operation, and we would hope they will make the necessary arrangements and take the course along with their underage drivers. Several people completed the course last year but did not pick up their cards. These will be available at registration this year.

<u>Museum-</u> Have you visited the Steam-O-Rama Museum yet? Add it to your list of must see items. Located in our Tobacco Shed, the museum houses many items donated to the society over the years and stored to wait for a place to be displayed. Many of the items have been skillfully restored by Russ Hoffman who stepped forward when we asked for a volunteer to work on some society owned equipment. Since those first few items pictured in the newsletter, Russ has worked on many items for display. We have acquired additional items to complete some displays and continue to search for some elusive pieces to complete some areas. Future plans are to have the museum open year round to individuals and groups by appointment. Leroy Sterner has designed and produced a display sign picturing museum items and cards are being printed to hand out showing contact information for the museum. This will be displayed at events large and small to help create interest in our museum. Admission will be free with donations being accepted. We are always interested in obtaining additional items for display. Any director can provide information.

<u>On Sight Parking-</u> Parking for workers and vendors during Steam-O-Rama has become increasingly congested as more and more people think they need to fill space they perceive as unused when they enter the grounds, then continue to park there throughout the day when areas should be filling with displays and other vendors. Unless you have been charged with the job of finding these illegal parkers, you have no idea how frustrating the job can be. All vendors and many workers have received a letter addressing this problem. There are a limited number of spaces for kitchen workers who arrive very early and depart very late. If you wish to use one of these spots you need to get a mirror card from Sue to allow you to park there. For those who are able, there is golf

cart and Gator shuttles for workers and you can get phone numbers also from Sue to call to be shuttled to and from the kitchen. For anyone who wants to complain about the special treatment these workers get, you are invited to come and help through all the special workdays before during and after the show, put in 12 to15 hour days through show week and then see what you have to complain about. The rest of the workers and helpers need to park in the designated parking areas, ride the people mover or bring your own on sight transportation. There will be NO PARKING in the Antique Car area, the immediate registration area, flea market and engine area aisles, near fuel tanks and in the parade route. Everyone needs to think when they are parking their vehicle, "It's open now but what about 2...3...4 hours from now". No one has time to hunt down owners on a busy Friday or Saturday during the show. You are a member and need to set an example for the others entering our grounds. Please make every attempt to cooperate with the parking regulations.

People Mover- The Society People Mover is for getting people around the showgrounds and back to their cars. While ours is not a terribly large showgrounds, the elderly and handicapped need help in moving from one area to another, and the people mover is handicap accessible. All others need to remember that walking is an excellent exercise and the people who need help most will be transported first. All people riding the people mover need to stay seated at all times until it comes to a complete stop. Children should not be riding without a parent or guardian present and will not be allowed to ride more than one full round. It is not an amusement ride for children's entertainment through the weekend. There will be clearly marked trolley stops around the area where you can wait for the People Mover to arrive. **NO JUMPING ON AND OFF BETWEEN STOPS!** As usual the society needs help to run the people mover. One person is needed to drive the tractor and a second person needs to be on the wagon at all times to help people who need it. If you are willing to donate some time, please let Charlie I. or Sue know so she can add your name to the list.

Worker's Lunch and Dinner- We will repeat the effort to feed our workers during Steam-O-Rama again this year. Each day lunch will be served from 11 to 1 and dinner from 4 to 6. There will be a serve yourself buffet set up inside the double doors in the newer part of the kitchen. This will not be an open menu, but may include menu items on certain days. Hot and cold drinks will also be available at the same location. If workers wish to eat from the menu they can go through the line and add their choices to their food tab and pay the same as before. This is meant to ease the confusion at the kitchen door near the cash register and to give all workers an opportunity to schedule time to eat. This is also an extra job for kitchen workers and we are looking for someone who might be willing to coordinate this effort. If you really don't want to serve the public, but would consider helping feed the workers, let Sue know and we'll fill you in on details. To all those workers out there, wear your "WORKER" ribbons proudly and check in for details. Each worker is expected to sign in and if not recognized, questions may be asked. Food donations for the workers meals, especially desserts will be gratefully accepted and can be dropped off at the kitchen any time during the week. We look forward to seeing everyone come out for the 2014 Steam-O-Rama, our 58nd Anniversary and the 30th show at our own Showgounds.

<u>Pennsylvania Farm Show-</u> January 9 to16, 2016. Our theme this year will be a repeat of "The Farmer's Wife". We are looking for items used by the farmer's wife in everyday life, from cookbooks to irons, gadgets to toys.

We will be needing items for our display. We have 400 square feet to fill. Advertisements, literature, manuals and instruction books are also needed. Sue Knaub is coordinating the display and will consider any suggestions and additions to the display. All items need to be clearly marked so they can be returned to their rightful owners after the farm show. Call her at the number on the inside of the cover. Help is always welcome at the farm show. We have averaged about \$2300 in ticket sales each year, some years better than others. We car pool from the show grounds almost every day and anyone is welcome to fill the seats available.

We thank **Jeff's Crane Service, Beard's Towing, River's Garage, and Markey Trucking** for their continued monetary support of our Farm Show display. This year our Space will cost \$1600 for the week's rent. Add to that the cost of making many round trips with workers and display materials- the cost would be prohibitive to the society if we did not have their generous support
